The last few snowy months have allowed our team much needed time to focus on multiple strategic initiatives that we have undertaken at the History Center. Together, all these initiatives are designed with you in mind as we constantly strive to improve your experience.

Through multiple design meetings, we are in the final stages of debuting our new Frank Lloyd Wright Field Office Museum. This significant expansion to our existing Wright office will be sure to delight both members of our community and those around the globe. Be on the lookout for information about our grand opening this coming summer.


In addition to our Wright office expansion, it has been a two-year goal to create an interactive visitor experience for the History Center. Digital experiences augment the traditional tour and add a level of content and context to the overall museum experience. As you might imagine, this technology comes with a significant price tag. Thanks to the generosity of New York-based business leader and philanthropist Michael Bloomberg, we have partnered with Bloomberg Philanthropies to undertake this exciting endeavor. The total cost is being completely underwritten by Bloomberg Philanthropies. The design process, in conjunction with Bloomberg staff, will take us thirteen weeks, so we anticipate launching our interactive guide the week of June 30.

In addition, we have been working with the world's only sunflower distillery, the Wilds Sonshine Factory located in Kane, PA to announce our upcoming joint cooperative farm agreement at the Battles Estate in Girard. We will plant over 1.2 million sunflowers for the

region's enjoyment, creating one of the largest sunflower fields located within the tristate area. After the sunflowers are past peak and dry on their stalks, we will harvest the seeds and take them to the Sonshine Factory where they will be distilled into vodka and whiskey. We will be paid for our seeds based on the daily commodity rate at the time of harvest. History will come full circle as this will be the first time since the Battles family owned the property that we will plant and harvest our own crops.

Finally, we have resumed work at the White House in Girard and look forward to debuting the finished property at this year's Women Creating a Legacy event and the Annual Meeting/Summer Member Party. Until then, we hope to see you on April 29 at our spring lecture on the Trinity of American Architecture hosted by Kimberly N. Montague, AIA the CEO of Detroit-based Kahn Architecture.

A Million Sunflowers Will Light Up Girard



If you visited our Girard sunflower fields in 2024, prepare to be amazed in 2025. We partnered with the world's only sunflower distillery, the Wilds Sonshine Factory, located in Kane, Pennsylvania, to plant over 1.2 million sunflowers creating one of the largest sunflower fields within the tristate area.

After the sunflower season ends, we will harvest the seeds, sell them and take them to the Wilds Sonshine Factory where they will be distilled into vodka and whiskey.

So, history will come full circle! We will plant and harvest our own crops, just like the Battles family did when they owned the property.

This decision is deeply personal. My family has a long-standing connection to the Watson-Curtze Mansion. My grandmother, Margharita Curtze Vicary, and great uncle, R. Adm. Charles Curtze, used to share fond stories of wonderful family holidays spent at the house. My cousins donated the home to the Erie School District for use as a museum, and my father helped bring the museum under the umbrella of the Erie County Historical Society. He later acquired and donated the property that houses the King-Mertens Archive Building.



Along with other Curtze cousins, I have served on the board of the Erie County Historical Society and Hagen History Center.

The mission of the Hagen History Center resonates strongly with me. Through its work, the HHC doesn't just preserve my own family's stories, but the stories of families all across the county. The historical archives, artifacts, and displays provide a window into the past, ensuring that history remains alive for the

residents of Erie County. New exhibits continue to find ways to tell stories that offer an opportunity for people to find their place within the rich tapestry of our shared history.

Including the Hagen History Center in my estate planning is my way of helping ensure that the stories, artifacts, and history we cherish today continue to be preserved and shared tomorrow. Elk Creek Township Historical Society Shares "The Little Church on the Hill."

Founded in Wellsburg in 1855, the Universalist church had its final closing in 1957, and signed over the building to the Elk Creek Township with the request for it to be used as a community center. The building stood mostly unused until 1989 when a group of interested township residents began holding events to fund preservation projects that continue to this day. This church has now become a community treasure to the people of Elk Creek.

Triggering History: Legacy of Erie Firearms

Pre-Civil War-era firearms that are either directly or indirectly related to Erie are on display in the mansion.

Some of the firearms were made by Erie firearm manufacturers Daniel Weeks and Henry S. Drake, both located on State Street at the time.

Additional firearms are linked to Henry Jarecki's brass foundry and Hugh Lord's family and company, the Lord Corporation.

New Discoveries: Mad Anthony Wayne

A lock of hair and a letter add to the story of eerie legend



Thanks to Archivist Steven Mooriadian, the creepy story of Anthony Wayne's death (chronicled in our Wood-Morrison House), now showcases a lock of Wayne's hair, clipped by Mary Dobbins, the wife of Captain Daniel Dobbins, upon Wayne's exhumation in 1809.

Steven also found a letter from American soldier Henry Whitney that details the grisly condition of Wayne's body – before it was boiled. This story has fascinated everyone for centuries.


